B-24E #42-7007

October 23, 1943

On the morning of October 23, 1943, B-24E #42-7007 took off from Mountain Home Army Air Field, Idaho, for a formation flying training mission. The aircraft was with the 470th Bomb group, 800th Bomb Squadron. The lead aircraft had already taken off and was circling the field. #42-7007 climbed to 3,000 feet and was approaching the lead aircraft from the left to occupy the #2 position next to it. The pilot misjudged his speed and distance, overshot, and struck the other B-24 on the trailing edge of the wing and aft fuselage. #42-7007 exploded and plummeted into a dry wash several miles from the runway, killing all eight men on board. The lead aircraft, B-24J #42-73235, flew a short distance before the left wing tore off. It crashed in rolling hills a quarter mile away, killing all the crewmen. The large pieces of #42-7007 were removed in 1943, but some wreckage is still buried in the soft sand of the dry wash and hidden under thick brush. Site visited on 4/8/20.
